Girl Scout Bronze, Silver and Gold Award Girl Scouts of Middle Tennessee Information

Although Bronze Award Take Action Projects (TAP) do not require pre-approval from the Girl Scouts of Middle Tennessee, Silver and Gold Award Take Action Projects must be pre-approved.

- 💱 The Cadette troop volunteer submits a Silver Award Project proposal for each Take Action Project
- Each girl submits a Silver Award Final Report which outlines her leadership role in completing the project. All final reports for a project must be submitted at the same time.
- Senior and Ambassador girls must submit a Gold Award Take Action project pre-approval form for review
- Upon receiving pre-approval, girls pursuing the Gold Award will need to schedule an interview with the committee.
 - At the conclusion of the interview, girls will be advised as to whether they may being their Take Action Project or if further work is needed.

All Take Action Projects (Bronze, Silver and Gold) require final paperwork to be submitted to the Girl Scouts of Middle Tennessee. Upon review of final paperwork, girls will be advised of the status of their project. If projects meet all criteria, girls will be eligible to receive the appropriate recognition.

- Bronze Award certificates are provided by the council. Bronze Award pins may be purchased from the shop with proper council documentation. Bronze Award ceremonies are done on a local level.
- Silver and Gold Award recognitions are provided by the council. Silver and Gold Award ceremonies are held at the council level.

We are committed to ensuring that every girl has a successful experience in pursuit of our highest awards. Should a Take Action Project be judged to not meet the quality standards set forth, we will work with girls and their advisors to assist them in bringing their project up to an acceptable level. We are available for consultations, advice and assistance at any time during the process.

4 Key Points for Each of the Highest Awards

BRONZE Award®

- TAP: meets a need or improves their local or Girl Scout community
- \rightarrow SUSTAINABILITY: thought given to how their actions can be long lasting
- THINK GLOBALLY: are there any other local communities or Girl Scout councils that have this same need?
- \Im SPREAD THE WORD: share your story with others who could be inspired to make a difference, too

SILVER Award®

- TAP: meets a need to improve their neighborhood or local community in collaboration WITH the community
- SUSTAINABILITY: demonstrate an understanding of how their improvement can continue
- THINK GLOBALLY: how it connects/relates to others outside of her school or community
- SPREAD THE WORD: share your story to get others to act to continue the project

GOLD Award®

- $\mathbf{\hat{v}}$ TAP: addresses the root cause of an issue while meeting a need in the community
- SUSTAINABILITY: provides sustainable change & includes provisions for continuation of TAP after the Girl Scout is no longer involved
- THINK GLOBALLY: girls identify a global or national link to the community issue that their TAP addresses
- SPREAD THE WORD: provisions are made to educate and inspire others to join you in addressing your issue
