



Troop Leader Guide

Ask your parents, guardians, and family members to promise 4 Hours, 4 Her!

The "4Her Promise" is an open door for all adults in a girl's life to participate in Girl Scouts and support their troop. Girls who have family support and participation in their Girl Scout adventures are more likely to stay in Girl Scouts. And families want to ensure their girl feels supported. In fact, one out of four people say they don't volunteer because no one asked them to-so, let's ask!

Set Expectations and Build a Network of Support

- Hold a family meeting early on to build a network of success and set an expectation for everyone.
- Encourage adult helpers to register as Girl Scout members. And keep in mind it's a required step for many support roles. Begin at gsmidtn.org/councilalignment
- Invite families to participate with a minimum of 4 hours and provide a wide variety of options and tasks to choose from. See provided handout.
- Provide flexible volunteer schedules-let families choose between 4 hours per day, week, month, or year!
- Request that everyone put their commitment in writing with the "4Her Promise" handout. Be sure to clearly communicate that some volunteers are required to register as a member and some roles require background checks.
- Stay in communication by creating a troop calendar, budget, and plan for updating families.
- After your families complete their promise, they will hand their commitment slip to you. Turn them in to your Regional Executive to collect the special patches for your families, and pass them out at your next meeting to those who earned them!

Delegate Tasks - Large and Small - for Families to Help With

- Manage the troop product programs as Troop Coordinator*
- Manage troop funds and bank account as the Troop Finance Manager*
- Become a Certified Troop Camper* and chaperone camping and other outdoor adventures
- Help as a Chaperone* for field trips, activities, and other events.
- Be the troop's Communication Coordinator-share troop news with families and Service Unit
- Provide transportation for outings and activities as a Driver*
- Support as the troop's Event Coordinator-coordinate logistics, venue-set-up, décor, food etc. for special troop events.
- Provide general support to leaders during meetings as a Helper
- Shop and prep troop supplies, snacks or other items as a Shopper and Prepper

Recognize & Retain

- Ask families about their satisfaction with the project or task they took on and for their ideas to improve the volunteer experience.
- Publicly thank and recognize each girl and her family when they fulfill the 4Her Promise.
- Take it a step further and build a stronger support system by including families in the troop's special events and celebrations.

- Provide a solid support base and strengthen a girl's chances of longevity with the troop–leaders have reported lack of parent support as the number one reason troop members quit.
- Significantly increase communication—and camaraderie—among all the troop's families.
- Witness your Girl Scout develop leadership skills in Girl Scouting.

	* *	Troop Treasurer	 Helps with budgeting, collections, deposits, and payments. Keeps accurate troop records and submits financial reports in a timely manner. Signer on the troop checking account.
	*	Troop Fall Product Coordinator (TFPC)	 Manages and coordinates troop participation in the fall product program. Attends service unit product program training. Trains girls and parents/guardians at a troop meeting. Reviews and distributes product orders
	* * •	Troop Cookie Coordinator (TCC)	 Manages and coordinates troop participation in the Girl Scout Cookie Program. Attends service unit cookie program training. Trains girls and parents/guardians at a troop meeting. Confirms orders with parents/guardians and enters all data into cookie program database (eBudde)
	*	Cookie Program Booth Chaperone	Sets up booth table and chaperone shifts of girls during direct sales. Collects money from booth sale and returns to troop cookie manager.
	•	Service Project Coordinator	Helps troop leaders and girls plan and complete community service projects.
	•*•	Outdoor Experience Coordinator	Helps plan camp outing(s) or other outdoor experiences with girl and adult input.
	*	Driver	 Transports group of girls to field trip locations. Must have valid driver's license and vehicle insurance.
	♦	Shopper or Prepper	Shops for troop supplies, including badges, or preps needed materials.
	•	Ceremony/Recognition Coordinator	Works with leaders to plan troop ceremonies, such as investiture at start of year, bridging at end of year, and awards at end and/or middle of year.
