The Nissan Foundation was created in 1992 as a thoughtful response to the three weeks of violent civil unrest that occurred near Nissan North America’s then U.S. sales and marketing operations in Southern California following the Rodney King trial verdict. Nissan established a \$5 million endowment to promote cultural diversity within southern Los Angeles neighborhoods.

In the more than 30 years since, the Nissan Foundation has awarded nearly \$16 million to more than 150 nonprofit organizations to support innovative programs that break down societal barriers and build inclusive communities through education and outreach. Grant recipients promote cultural diversity across a variety of arts, education, social and public programs in seven U.S. communities where Nissan operates.

“It’s an honor to award Girl Scouts of Middle Tennessee a grant for the work it’s doing to promote, share and sustain cultural awareness and understanding in communities throughout our world,” said Chandra Vasser President of the Nissan Foundation and Nissan’s first Chief Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Officer.

With a mission to develop young women of courage, confidence, and character, Girl Scouts of Middle Tennessee has long been committed to an inclusive environment valuing diversity. In 1942, the non-profit officially recognized Josephine Holloway as America’s first Black troop leader, then opened the first Girl Scout camp for girls of color in 1955. Currently, girls of all backgrounds enjoy adventures at Camp Holloway, Girl Scouts of Middle Tennessee’s property in Millersville.
